
We go beyond traditional roles by educating the public about poverty, advocating for its reduction and championing policy changes. Together, we are not just addressing issues; we are transforming lives.

Have you met Alice?

ALICE® is an acronym for Asset Limited, Income Constrained and Employed

ALICE families often find innovative ways to get by and navigate issues such as food insecurity, difficulty paying bills, reducing debt and maintaining health care. Living paycheck to paycheck can take a toll on mental health and wellness. Dismantling poverty is not only about programs and services. Understanding and working to shift systems that create wealth disparities ensures our success.

> At CSF, luogafa shared her story with financial and employment coaches who connected her with Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) services, helping her obtain a driver's license and state credentialing. While balancing dental assistant studies and family, she followed her coach's advice to inquire about a job at her children's dental clinic, which led to a full-time position with a living wage. The CSF team then helped her update her budget and set new goals.

Today, luogafa is thriving, considering further education in health administration, reunited with her spouse and watching her children excel in school and sports. She credits the CSF for helping her believe in a brighter future.

At a friend's urging, luogafa walked into the Bethel School District's Center for Strong Families (CSF), exhausted and seeking long-term solutions for her family. As an Army spouse with five children under 15, she

Over 74,000 calls were made by individuals and families in need to our free helpline, South Sound 211, where they were connected with vital services. Your generosity funded a lifeline for thousands, connecting them to crucial resources and support during times of crisis. Thank you!

More than 7,600 individuals were connected to rental assistance. You helped families avoid eviction and stay in their homes, providing stability and peace of mind during difficult times.

Close to 6,500 people were connected to shelter services. Your contributions ensured that those experiencing homelessness found safe places to stay, protecting them from the elements and giving them a chance to recover.

3,345 people were connected to transportation services. You facilitated access to reliable transportation, helping individuals get to job interviews, work, medical appointments and other essential destinations, ultimately supporting their journey towards stability and self sufficiency.

Strong Families

Earn it, Keep it, Grow it. Thank you for supporting countless families and individuals in building resilience through financial and employment coaching and training at our seven CSF centers across the county.

Our network of 22 dedicated coaches equipped families with the tools and resources they needed to secure livingwage careers, develop financial action plans, reduce debt and build their assets.

In 2023 alone, we served over 2,892 families and individuals. Thanks to your support, our clients experienced an average monthly income increase of \$1,936.
